PASTOR'S PASSION

If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever—the Spirit of truth. (John 14:15-17)

OUTREACH

Junktique

In 1998 a group of 12 interested disciples of Nativity Volunteers went to Haiti with former pastor Dr. William Roen. There they visited "Village of Hope" which was in the process of expanding with a new school building. It was the voluteers from NLC who helped mix cement, lay bricks, build tables, benches and painting. While there they met missionary Carol Herget, who was director of this outreach program.

Carol's student, Gasnel Anilus, wanted to start another school. In 2000 Carol asked Pastor Roen for help. Pastor Roen reached out to the members of NLC. Little did they know just how involved NLC would become. Their need to raise funds resulted in the first Junktique being held in November 2000, under the direction of Ernie and Lilo Horeis.

The first Junktique was held in one room and went over extremely



well. The money from the sale went to provide funding for the school and a Christmas Eve meal for the children and their parents in Haiti. The following year, Carol again asked Pastor Roen and NLC members for help to purchase a piece of land for the school. Once again, NLC came through with the second Junktique sale. A team from Nativity went to Haiti in 2002 to help build the first combination classroom-church. This facility helped give 134 children an education and hot meals.

From 2003 to the first half of 2009, the Junktique sale was held twice a year. It was an excellent outreach program and fund raiser. 50% of the money made went to Haiti and the other 50% went to local organizations.

In the second half of 2009, Digby and David Janus volunteered to take the lead for this event. Ernie and Lilo Horeis were chairpersons from 2011-2013. Beginning in 2014, through the most recent sale in October 2017, June and Buddy Kristoferson led the annual Junktique sale.

The funds from this event have provided support in Haiti which included building two schoolschurches, a kitchen-dining room,



and served over one million hot meals to the children of both schools.

Nativity ministries have also received money from Junktique sale for special projects and the food pantry. Under the direction of Buddy and June and with over 50 volunteers, the October 2017 sale brought in \$9,938.33, half went to the food pantry and half to the NLC emergency fund. Unsold items were donated to the Florida Sheriff's Youth Ranches and Habitat for Humanity.

This annual event has certainly been a blessing to many people. NLC would like to keep it going in 2018. Buddy and June have done a terrific job and we applaud them and all the previously leaders. However, they are stepping down as chairpersons. The hope is that one or more people will step up and take over this annual event. Buddy

exhibition and dinner at Ulele on the Hillsborough River Walk.


- Potluck at Pine Island beach joined by several friendly dolphins. God's beautiful world!



Acolytes & Crucifers

The word acolyte means "attendant" or "one who helps". Whether you light the candles, carry the cross, are a banner bearer, provide the offering plates to the ushers, offer juice to the communicants or are a book bearer - you are considered an acolyte. As an acolyte and crucifer, you are joining the ranks of those who have helped with the worship service since the early Christian church. Some say that acolytes have an even longer history - Samuel, who assisted Eli in the Old Testament Temple was really the first acolvte.

The acolyte and crucifer are an essential part of the Nativity Lutheran Church worship service. The crucifer carries the processional cross and leads the procession into and out of the church; acolytes are responsible for lighting and extinguishing the altar candles, receiving the offering, and performing other duties as requested by the pastor.

The age at which a young person may serve as an acolyte or crucifer is determined by the pastor, following a discussion with the parent or guardian and child. Central to the discussion is the ability of the child to perform the necessary tasks, and the desire of the child to serve in this capacity. A short training session is required.

Many of the acolytes and crucifers are also members of the Confirmation Class. This service is a wonderful way for young people to be involved in the worship service and to give glory to God. It would be ideal if we were able to increase the membership of this team. Children interested in serving as an acolyte or crucifer should contact Ruth Ann Hoy at 727-403-8867.
