

Could you send one of your beloved children or loved ones to an occupied territory in a harsh environment with corrupt religious leaders to live among people whose nature is to serve only themselves?

That is exactly what God did for his beloved children – US. "For God so loved the world that He gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through Him." (John 3:16-17)

What would you do for one of your beloved children or loved ones? Would you give them hope, a way to a better life, forgive all their wrongdoing with the opportunity to go to a better place?

Throughout history, God sent messengers to guide people to Him. But they failed to remain faithful. God promised, as prophesied in the Hebrew Bible, to send a Messiah - the promised deliverer of the Jewish nation and the savior of humankind. The Greek word "euaggelion" is the word for Gospel meaning **good news**. The 'good news' of Jesus Christ is the gospel message that Jesus did what we cannot do. He died as a substitute in our place, to make atonement for our sins and put all who believe and trust in Him into a right relationship with God.

The name Jesus means **God saves**. Jesus not only communicated what we needed to know about God's love but lived His life as an example of how we should live to honor, show our love and thankfulness to God. God has given people a choice to love Him or reject Him. He did not want us to be forced to love Him. He wanted people to get to know Him and love Him by their own choice.

God, in His righteousness and mercy, gave us Jesus, as our way to become righteous, without guilt before the Father in love. *(Ephesians 1:4)* When you hear the Gospel, and believe that Jesus died on the cross for you, something happens inside you. We are changed from the inside. God's Holy Spirit becomes embodied in us.


HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS DID YOU KNOW?

Why do we call the Resurrection of Jesus "Easter"?

Many scholars believe it has to do with the solar cycle. Easter follows in close proximity to the vernal equinox, when there are equal periods of light and darkness. This is the beginning of spring, a time of new life. This symbolism is used to explain the new life and rebirth given to us by Jesus' resurrection.

Easter is the term used in primarily English-speaking countries, while other cultures use the term "Passover", for instance; "Pascha" in Greek, "Pascua" in Spanish, "Pâques" in French. Easter is the oldest Christian holiday and the most important day of the church year.

Likewise, scholars believe that the main reason Jesus' birth came to be celebrated on December 25th is because that was the date of the winter solstice according to the Roman calendar. The days following the winter solstice gradually become longer and less dark. It is also, ideal symbolism to clarify the birth of "the light of the world" as stated in the New Testament's Gospel of John.



Again, Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

COMMUNITY LIFE FINANCE TEAM

Nativity Lutheran Church's financial committee is made up of 4 groups that focus on the physical responsibilities of the church. Their purpose is to assure the financial soundness of Nativity. Nativity's financial committees are part of the Community Life Ministry which consists of the Finance Committee, Audit, Counters and Data Entry.



The **Finance Committee** meets on the second Tuesday of every month

to exam the previous month's financial statements of the church and compare them to the monthly and yearly budgets. Discrepancies and variations are noted and discussed. Recommendations for action may be implemented. The largest task of the Finance Committee is preparing the next year's fiscal budget. Beginning in the Fall of each year, a subcommittee looks at current budget trends and uses this and previous years' historical data on which to base next year's income and spending. Nativity's Committee Chairpersons are also solicited for input. This initial budget is presented to the Church Council and if approved, presented by the Treasurer the vearly at Congregational Meeting held in November. This Budget is voted on by the Congregation. If passed by a majority, it becomes the following year's budget. The budget is included in the Congregation's

Annual Report and used to measure monthly income and spending/ expenses. Michele Oliver is the Finance Committee's Chairperson.

The Audit Committee is usually



staffed by accountants and members of the Finance Committee and meets quarterly to review all financial

transactions made by the Treasurer. This ensures oversight of the established financial practices at Nativity. The Audit committee is chaired by Janet Wilkens.

The **Counters** are headed by Ernie Horeis. They meet Monday mornings to count the offerings and contributions from the previous



week. Their job requires sorting by type of contribution and ensuring that the cash and checks balance before depositing in the bank. They also prepare the paperwork for data entry.

The **Data Entry** volunteers assure that weekly giving is credited to every individuals' contribution statement. These contributions are assigned various deposit codes based on the individuals' designations and keyed into a church software program. This software program is used to generate individual giving statements and for the Treasurer to write checks and debit




accounts when paying monthly bills. The chairperson for Data Entry is Jean Drach.

The Council members currently sitting on the various financial committees include the Financial Secretary, Co-Treasurers and Council President. Other members who have joined these financial committees include current Nativity members with data processing and/ or accounting experience, previous council members, and the Pastor.

Celebration of Ministries!!!

In the past year your Stewardship Committee has been focusing on commitment of time and talent. That commitment, of course, is to the ministries of our church. The Celebration of Ministries event was conceived as a way to inform our congregation about the many ministries we support, and provide an avenue for members to commit to volunteering time and talent to a ministry that appeals to their desire to help. Because there had never been an event like this, the Stewardship Committee did not know what a good measure of "success" would be.











It was decided that attendance of 75 persons would be a "success," as long as ten ministries received at least one new volunteer. On the Saturday of the event we had 80 visitors. The displays were left out so that at the next day's Coffee Hour which followed each service in Winemiller Hall could provide additional exposure to the many opportunities to commit.

The great results of the event were:

- 53 commitments to volunteer
- 33 ministries have interested volunteers
- 35 individuals volunteered

The Stewardship Committee has made a concerted effort to make sure every volunteer was contacted and welcomed. All ministries continue to be open to welcoming new volunteers who are interested in serving.

FOOD PANTRY

How familiar are you with the Nativity Lutheran Church Food Pantry? Did you know that NLC's Food Pantry is the only church pantry open for more than 1 day a week for a couple of hours? The NLC Food Panty is open Monday through Friday from 9:30am to 1:00pm. This community outreach program serves 200 – 250 families a week. Donations of non-perishable food items, hygiene products and clothing are greatly appreciated and can be dropped off during food pantry hours, placed in the grocery cart located in the church narthex before or after worship services or during church office hours between 9am to 2pm Monday through Friday. Monetary donations are also welcomed. Checks should be make out to NLC and writing Food Panty on the memo line.



Residents of Hernando County are eligible recipients of the Food Pantry. The recipient selects an item from each of several shelves including hygiene products to fill a plastic grocery bag. In addition, they may choose a bread and something from the clothing rack.

It can be really hard to be in need of help and even harder to ask for help. The welcoming hospitality, with an offer of a cup of coffee and snack, says to our brothers and sisters in Christ, we care!

Volunteers are needed to keep the pantry open and keep this ministry going! Stop by and meet Bonnie Kuester and her volunteers at our Food Pantry located in the Administration Building. Make a "Jopful Koise to the Rord"

Nativity Ringers, one of Nativity's most vibrant groups, is part of the Worship & Music team that falls under the Spiritual Life Ministry headed by Jack Page and Ruth Ann Hoy. It plays a three-octave set of Malmark English hand bells and a three-octave set of hand chimes. Additional bells are added from time to time.

The main purpose of this group is to use God's gift of music to support and enrich Nativity's worship services using the liturgical calendar. In addition, bell playing brings interested players together to express different ways of presenting music using tuned individual bells and chimes that are rung in chords.

Nativity Ringers was established in 1998 by Aina Rappold. Kathy Proctor succeeded her as director until September 2017 when Jane Henkel and Cherylann Schneider became co-directors. Most of the bells have been donated through Nativity's Designated Memorial Fund. Each bell carries the name of an individual donor on its handle. The largest bells and much of the bell choir music are on loan from Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Spring Hill. This invaluable gift has been made possible through Nativity's ongoing relationship with Holy Cross.

Currently there are 12 bell ringers who rehearse weekly on Tuesday evenings from 6-8pm in the Sanctuary. The Ringers enjoy offering a monthly selection at both Sunday services. In the past Nativity Ringers or ensembles within the group have played at funerals and memorial services, Christmas Eve services, Timber Pines Christmas programs and local nursing homes.

New ringers are always welcome with one-on-one instruction beginning at 5pm prior to the group rehearsal on Tuesdays. Additional ringers could expand the choir by using bells that now sit unused. Trained substitutes are always needed. Reading music is not required to play in the bell choir-just the ability to count. 




There are 6 congregation members that were part of the "Founders" of Nativity Lutheran Church, signers of the original church charter.
