PASTOR'S PASSION

The Commission to share Jesus— Today's Evangelism

Jesus commissions us to share His love and spread his teachings. As we read in *Matthew 28:19-20 "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age".*

How do we share what our heart knows? How do we put our faith into words so that others can understand and what Jesus wants them to hear? How do we move from being a disciple, a follower of Jesus, to an apostle, one who is sent out as a messenger?

The first step is prayer. Asking Jesus to help us see His will. Asking Him to give us the courage to share His gift of love and salvation. James 1:5 "If any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask God, who gives generously to all without reproach, and it will be given him".

Second, studying is the key to knowing how to explain and defend our faith. Reading the bible and attending bible studies gives us the knowledge to express what's in our hearts and explain it to others. 1 Peter 3:15 "But in your hearts honor Christ the Lord as holy, always being prepared to make a defense to anyone who asks you for a reason for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and respect".

Third, make an effort to announce your faith openly, praising or thanking God for the gifts He has given us. Like, "Thank you Lord for my family, friends or neighbors" or saying grace before a meal with loved ones and guests. Isaiah 12:4 And you will say in that day: "Give thanks to the Lord, call upon his name, make known his deeds among the peoples, proclaim that his name is exalted".

Fourth, as the saying goes "Actions speak louder than words". Make the effort to help a neighbor, take the time to speak to a stranger or listen patiently to the lonely. 1 Corinthians 11:1-2 "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ. Now I commend you because you remember me in everything and maintain the traditions even as I delivered them to you".

Fifth, invite others, members and non-members, to join us at worship, a ministry activity or a social event at church. Hand out flyers at a civic event. Joy is contagious and it opens minds and hearts.

2 Corinthians 5:20 "Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us".

These are some of the things we can do to achieve the commission Jesus gave us and be a messenger evangelist in today's world. "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another". John 13:35

BIBLE STUDY

From Disciples to Apostles

Learning and Spreading

the Good News

After Jesus was baptized, he spent approximately three years teaching, preaching and healing. People gathered to hear this man who taught with authority, unlike any others. Jesus invited people to follow him and apply his teachings. Jesus said, "Come to me, all you that are weary

and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your soul." (Matthew 11:28)

Jesus taught, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-40) It sounds simple, but it is challenging to live these commandments in daily life. Jesus began with listeners, those intrigued, inspired and convicted by his teachings. Then, Jesus invited them to follow him, learning more each day. This was part of a greater plan to send his followers on a mission.

Our four-session class from May 2 to May 23 went fast. We learned about some of the different faith

communities' applications of Jesus' Great Commission (the mandate to spread the Word) to his disciples after his Resurrection. We explored the meaning of Jesus' mission, the local churches' understanding of Jesus' way of life, looked at biblical conversion stories and articulated our own statement of faith drawing from personal life experiences. appreciated every person's faith sharing and realized that conversion is not necessarily a one-time dramatic event but can take place over a period of time. By remembering our personal encounter with Jesus and reflecting on it, we become more confident and are

equipped to make a defense of our faith and hope (1 Peter 3:15).



A new session is planned for the Fall. Consider Jesus' call to study His word and make the time to attend the Fall session of "From Disciples to Apostles".

Communion and Visitation

A bereaved husband placed 3 stacks of calling cards on the communion rail. Each 4-inch stack was tied with a ribbon. When he was asked what they were, he explained that each stack represented a year's worth of cards from the Communion and Visitation members who had come to see his wife over the 3 years she was in assisted living. He had saved them and wanted the church to know how much the visits meant not only to his wife, but also to him.



Many folks retire to the Florida for the weather and the favorable cost of living. The biggest drawback is being without close family and friends. It is also hard on relatives who can't get here or at least not quickly, nor can they stay for long periods of time. The church becomes their surrogate family. Just like that favorite aunt, brother or friend who checks in on you, they bring a few minutes of prayer, joyful love and the world beyond their current situation. This is what the Communion and Visitation Ministry does.

Pastor Mattei, Janet Jones and Clyde Rosten were interviewed for this article. Their passion for this ministry is intense and very moving, as are the stories from members who shared the love, joy and comfort they and their loved ones experience as a result of the visits.

The Communion Ministers who bring the remembrance of our Lord Jesus Christ to members who are unable to attend Worship Services report that they too receive as much joy from bringing communion as the recipients do.

There are two ways you can help. First, if you know of someone who is hospitalized, in rehab, in assisted living or home bound, call the church with their name and the facility. Also, please stay in touch with the individual and let the church know if they move to another facility or are released to go home. This ensures visits are not missed. The second thing you can do is consider joining this ministry. Currently there are volunteers for Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday but Tuesday and Saturday do not have coverage. Another consideration would be to volunteer as a substitute, providing much the needed backup. For more information contact Pastor Mattei.

GOLF MINISTRY

The Nativity Golf Ministry is one of the several groups of the Community Life Ministry headed by Susan Lee. It meets monthly from October through May to play golf and enjoy fellowship with other Nativians and their friends.



The Golf Ministry was started in 2009 by the Nativity's Small Group Coordinating Committee chaired by Patty Trevor and Bob Drach. In February of 2010, the group conducted a survey of the congregation to find out what kinds of small groups might be of interest to members of the congregation. The results revealed a strong interest in golf, among other things.

Golfing in the Nativity Ministry revolves around teams of 4—usually randomly assigned by the organizer. This allows for all skill levels from 'duffer' to 'experienced'. Most times there are 20 players that equals 5 foursomes vying for the honor of the first and second place trophies and a closest-to-the-pin statue on a designated Par 3 hole.

The game is played as 'best ball' among each foursome; that is, each player tees off and whoever drives his/her ball the furthest or has the best lie/ placement is where the foursome hits from the second

time. This type of game continues until the ball is putted into the cup. The scoring is figured for the team. The team with the least cumulative number for nine holes, wins. Each organizer of the event may add rules and regulations for the fun of the game; but most times, it is played as standard 'best ball'.

Each month a volunteer organizer places a sign-up sheet with the logistics posted in the Narthex for those to express their interest in playing that month. Usually, there is a minimum number of players needed to ensure the price of play and a golf cart for each twosome. Historically, nine-hole games are played on the third Sunday of the month beginning at 2 pm. Afterwards, dinner is arranged by the organizer either at the Club House of the golf course or a nearby eatery. Spouses of the players are encouraged to join the supper fellowship.

The Golf Ministry is a fluid group and ANYONE who has an interest in golf is encouraged to join any month. Golf logistics are posted in advance in the Bulletin's

The Nativity Cup

Nativian golfers Ned Long and Bob Drach had the idea to build a traveling prize or trophy for the first-place team winners. Leftover mahogany wood and a wooden goblet found at a thrift store were the beginnings of the first-place prize, affectionately known as The Nativity Cup. It has since been updated with golf tees, halved golf balls, a small flag and a cutout star representing the Bethlehem Star, for Nativity. Ned Long fashioned the trophy using his woodworking skills and Bob Drach's woodworking tools. The second-place traveling team trophy was made with a twisted cup depicting a funny golf saying and mounted on more scrap mahogany; this second place 'cup' is now in its second rendition as it was dropped by a previous winner.
