## **Pastor's Passion**

### How much is enough?

"As Jesus started on his way, a man ran up to him and fell on his knees before him. "Good teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

Mark 10:17-31

We have probably asked that question when considering our monetary donations for the ministry of the Church. How much are we returning to God for God's goodness to us? The Bible suggests 10% or a tithe as in *Leviticus 27:30 "A tithe of everything from the land, whether* grain from the soil or fruit from the trees, belongs to the LORD; it is holy to the LORD."

So, how much are we keeping for ourselves? 90%, 95%, 99%? How much is enough for us to live on?

This team covers a myriad of responsibilities, such as using the visitor cards and guest register to contact each of our guests within 48 hours. The method of contact is based on the information the visitors provide. A list is maintained and repeat visitors are contacted by Pastor Mattei to ascertain their interest in membership. Individuals wanting to become members are invited and assisted by the team with the New Member Classes. Once the returning visitors have become members and selected their ministry of interest, their names are passed onto the corresponding ministry chair. In the future, the team plans to host an annual gathering of the current year's new members to ensure they are making the connections for a full congregational experience.

Membership has more than one category, one of which is associate member. This most often applies to Snowbirds, who attend 2 churches based on the season. The Synod has recommended changes in church constitutions to revise the definition and privileges of the associate member category. Information will be dispensed and voting on this and other changes to the constitution will take place at the Congregational Meeting in January.

Of course, there is always the *fun* part, that of recordkeeping. Once a year the membership roll of the church is reviewed for active, non-active, baptized and confirmed members which is then reported to the ELCA and included in the congregation's annual report. The team makes every effort to contact all non-active members. Records of weddings, transfers and deaths are also recorded in computer files and designated categories are written in the registry (the Red Book).

The team also tries to keep up with those who for one reason or another feel disconnected from the church. When a person leaves a church, there are only a few weeks (4 to 8 max) to bring them back before the hurt becomes too much and/or they get settled somewhere else (if they even go someplace else). When the hurt builds because it was not diffused by a simple effort of contact and care, these people may never come back to their home church or any church. The statistics tell us this is true in most churches and why many are failing. The Team tries to promptly identify and connect with those who are recognized as missing from our common fellowship and listen to their concerns. When an issue is identified, a solution is sought. In an ideal world, people with concerns would call the office to speak with our Pastor without delay.

In addition, we live in a community heavily populated with retirees. Some of them travel during the year for a few weeks and others leave for an extended time (our "Snowbirds") or relocate to be closer to family. It's hard sometimes to know the reason someone is missing unless there is timely communication. These are some of the challenges the Membership Team deals with.

So, as you can see, there is a lot to be done and as the saying goes "the more hands the lighter the work" or as chairperson Jean Drach would say

## **Book Club**

Nativity's Book Club had its beginnings in the home of Pastors Dan and Kris Wee in 2004. They and Pastor Phil Schroeder were the first leaders who took turns leading a discussion on a book read by the members of the group. That first 'meeting' began with a few Nativity members and continues to this day with eleven.

The monthly meetings originally began on Friday evenings; the current get-togethers are Friday afternoons, usually the fourth or fifth in the month. Meetings are held in a member's home chosen at the previous gathering. Meetings continue throughout the year with a month off in the summer.

Books are chosen by input from all with Pastor Schroeder guiding their choosing. Books that have previously been read are religious and secular books, fiction and non-fiction, historical and biographical. Books are chosen so that members can learn from as well as enjoy. Examples of challenging and provocative titles that have been read are: *We Were Eight Years in Power: An American Tragedy* by Ta Nehisi Coates and Jon Meacham's *The Soul of America: The Battle for Our Better Angels.* 

Pastor Schroeder sums up Nativity's Book Club as follows, "the Book Club nicely blends a monthly discussion of important topics in a getting-to-know-you gathering and an enjoyable reunion with friends. It is unhurried and unintimidating. A book takes on new meaning when it is reviewed and discussed with friends."

The Cards R Us Circle's mission is to make greeting cards from donated, used greeting cards. The recycled cards are placed on our kiosks in the narthex and in the Administration Building hallway, where they are offered for a donation. We have received funds to cover our tools and supplies from the Dorothy and David Trompeter Endowment Fund and from Thrivent. All profits are turned over to Pastor's Discretionary Fund, where they are given to people in need during onetime emergencies. In 2017, Cards R Us donated \$815 to the Discretionary Fund. Those being helped, sometimes members of Nativity, are in tough situations. Most often, the funds are given to people needing a room, security deposit, rent, fuel for their vehicle, taxi ride, bus ticket, food, or help paying a utility bill. In one instance, Pastor's Discretionary Fund was tapped to assist in paying a funeral home for their services. Those making the cards feel blessed that they can play a part in helping other people in difficult circumstances.

This mission is led by Susan Nordstrom, who was inspired by a visit in November 2011 to the Cedar Falls (Iowa) United Methodist Church, the church of her mother's childhood, where these cards were available in their narthex. When Susan approached Women of Nativity about this mission, they quickly agreed to support it. Nativity's Church Council agreed to this project. At the time, Hallmark was going out of business in the Gulf View Square Mall, so Susan purchased one of their used kiosks. Lilo Horeis and Margret Raeder initially demonstrated how to make the cards, as they had previously done this for Lighthouse for the Blind. They were up and running by March 2012.

Over the past 6 1/2 years, many members of Nativity have assisted, some cutting out embellishments and others crafting cards at their homes. They gather together in Al Lien Hall monthly, on the first and second Wednesdays of the month from 12:30 - 3pm, to make the cards. This ministry fosters creativity, friendship and lots of laughter. All are welcome to join.

Their cards are an example of up-cycling, benefiting the environment. They are one-of -a-kind. They provide members and visitors an opportunity to provide joy and caring to others. They bring smiles to faces. They are told on a regular basis how people receiving our cards appreciate and enjoy them. They actually have such a following that they have received donated used cards from people in St. Pete, Inverness, Michigan, New Jersey, etc. These people say this mission has touched their hearts and is the reason they can give their sometimes-precious cards to us.

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION



Our Confirmation ministry is spread over a three-year period. The curriculum follows the traditional tracks of Hebrew Scriptures, Christian Scriptures and Luther's Catechism. Youth, after 6<sup>th</sup> grade, can join us at any time during the three-year span.


This year, we looked at the Hebrew Scriptures and began with a study on the formation of the Bible. Beginning with the origin and development of the oral tradition, the chronological history of Israel, and the various parts of the Scriptures. We also explored the development of Israel's relationship with God moving from polytheism (worship of many gods) through monolatry (worship of one God without the denial of other gods) to monotheism (belief in only one God), with the purpose of connecting God's ever relevant command to worship Yahweh alone and no other gods or idols. Modern day attractive idols were identified, especially those that seem to grant power and affluence but only cause evil and damage human relationships.

Most importantly, we tried to respond to the questions "Why is the Word of God important to us?", "Is the Bible inspired Word or human word?" and "How do we make sense of contextual elements that do not resonate with our times?" The second year of study will concentrate on the Christian Scriptures and the proclamation of the Rule of God in God's Kingdom, the life-death-resurrection of Jesus, the missionary travels of Paul and other apostles and the call to discipleship.

In the third year we look at Luther's Catechism: The Creeds, the Sacraments, the Lord's Prayer, and the Ten Commandments.

The purpose is to move our youth to a personalized understanding of their relationship with the Lord. Following the pattern of God's revelations in the Hebrew Scriptures and Jesus' encounters in the Christian Scriptures we move from *academic information* (see Dt 11:19) to *faith exploration* (see John 3) to *Affirmation of Baptism* (see Romans 10:9) and finally to *social engagement* as exemplified in our Lutheran tradition of stewardship of resources, faith, talents, abilities, passions, treasure and advocacy on behalf of all creatures (See James 2:14-26).

Throughout the courses the students take notes and create their building blocks for a final Statement of Faith which they share with the congregation at the time of the celebration of their Affirmation of Faith (Confirmation).

Have you ever wondered who does such a wonderful job of taking care of our Altar every week and whenever there is a specific service?

It is a very important ministry called the Altar Guild. Members of the altar guild are comprised of some very dedicated people who have the privilege of preparing the worship space.

The Altar Guild is concerned with the care and placement of the furnishings, appointments and ornaments used in worship. After a service there are routine procedures to be done in order to prepare the worship area for the next week. The overall goal of the guild is to see that the worship space is kept beautiful and is in good order.

Linens and paraments are cleaned regularly and kept pressed. Paraments, the liturgical hangings and cloths that you see on and around the altar are inspected weekly to keep them spotless. The items that adorn the altar have appointed colors according to the liturgical

church calendar. For example, white indicates it is the Christmas Season or Easter. White is the color of light, gladness, purity and joy. Bright red is the color of fire, the fire of the Holy Spirit. Scarlet represents the color of the crucifixion. Purple is the penitential color of Lent. Blue is the preferred color for Advent because it is the color of hope. Green is the color of growth. Black, the color of ashes and humiliation and mourning, is appointed for Ash Wednesday. Gold is the preferred color for Easter Day.

Sacramental vessels and their worship items are kept clean and polished. Adequate supplies of communion wafers, wine, candles and other necessities are secured and properly stored. The Altar Guild secures the materials needed and prepares the Communion Sets used by the Home Communion During Ministers. the Maundy Thursday service they assist the Pastor in the ritual stripping of the altar, and on Thanksgiving, they decorate the altar with fruits and vegetables.

The Altar Guild meets on the third Wednesday of every month at 10:00 AM. The chairperson for the Altar Guild is Janet Devico.
