REFLECTIONS FROM THE 2022 SYNOD ASSEMBLY - JUNE 3-5.

Germaine and Claude Major, and their son Mark were Nativity voting members. There were about four hundred people (rostered and lay) from throughout the Synod in attendance.

The Synod Assembly opened with an Eucharistic Celebration.

The focus of the Synod Assembly was on ministry more than business. Therefore, many workshops were planned and offered. The Synod's theme was taken from Romans 12: Patient in Affliction, Faithful in Hope, Joyful in Hope.

Guest speakers:

The Rev. Dr. Phil Hirsch gave the Churchwide Report. He is the Executive Director of the Christian Community and Leadership Unit. Rev. Hirsch reported that the ELCA has contributed over \$900K to Global Missions; over \$500K to World Hunger appeals; over \$356K to Disaster Response; \$9M+ for the Eastern European crisis; \$1.8M for Covid 19 related ministries. During the covid period, 92 new ministries were launched. According to the Presiding Bishop, the Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, people seeking help online brows for 1. Prayer; 2. Loneliness; 3. Anxiety; 4. Marriage Help. The Rev. Dr. Darius Butena (PCUSA) was the ecumenical partner for the year. He observed that there are many similarities between the ELCA and the PCUSA especially in terms of demographics. We may be old and have little money but still have a calling from God. In his view, vibrant Christ-centered congregations 1. Build Relationships; 2. Have Spiritual Depth; 3. Are Missional, which he elaborated as having three components: A. Leadership Development (from "members' to "disciples"); B. Active Reconciliation; C. Clarity of Identity.

Keynote Address:

Dr. Luis Torres-Hostos gave the keynote address throughout the Assembly. Dr. Torres is the founding Dean and Professor of the School of Social Work at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley in Edinburgh Texas. His research focuses on health disparities and social determinants of health with a focus on Hispanic and African American communities, and on community engagement initiatives aimed at building community resilience. Dr. Torres has traveled and worked America, extensively in Latin and has established collaborations in Mexico, Central America, and Puerto Rico. He serves on the Board of Directors of the American Red Cross South Texas chapter and is a member of the Rotary Club of Mission. Originally from Puerto Rico, Dr. Torres holds a Doctorate in clinical psychology from Fordham University in New York City.

He developed his reflections on the Synod's theme.

The main insight I gained from his speech is that we need "cultural humility": loving my neighbor who looks/sounds different than me – this is both difficult and normal. Discrimination among people is a "natural" life skill and there is no shame in it. At the dawn of life, discrimination helped families and tribes survive potential life-threatening situations from foreign groups. Once a society is established, a rational behavior can be chosen over a reactive response to people who don't look like us. Being patient with ourselves and one another is difficult. We all have bias. We all discriminate. This does not make us bad or wrong. Seeing Jesus in the other is a choice we can make. Sharing the burden can help us all. We can start by recognizing our natural tendency to mistrust. Then, take a leap of faith and choose to recognize God in the "other" no matter how different from us.

There were ministry tables in the Connection Café and many pre-recorded videos highlighted ministries of the Synod churches. New Synod Council members were installed on Sunday.

Church is something to enjoy and look forward to and as long as we make the right steps the future of nativity should be smooth sailing from here on out.

Encouraging each other to grow in faith: Growing our understanding of the scripture and God's leading in our lives through study of the Word, meditation, and prayer; knowing that learning is not just a matter of the mind, but also of the heart, and that raising questions is sometimes of more value than finding answers.

Being responsible to God through the creative use of our income, possessions, time and talent; recognizing that loving our neighbor is not so much a feeling as it is an act of will, and that sharing what we have on behalf of the Kingdom of God is only giving back what was already God's to being with.

Celebrating the gift of life together: Loving our neighbor, losing ourselves and then finding ourselves, having discovered that the Good News means that it is impossible not to feel joy in the presence of the Savior.

OUR VALUES STATEMENT
