# Do We Honor the Saints in the Lutheran Church? If So, In Which Way?

Martin Luther was a "fan" of the saints. During his early years, he had been taught not only the names of countless saints, but their life stories as well. Reading books on the lives of the saints became a significant part of his personal devotional life. In a revealing comment, Luther stated that "next to the Holy Scripture there certainly is no more useful book for Christendom than that of the lives of the saints."

Luther made certain that each of the children born to him and his wife, Katherine, were named for one of the great saints of the past. His own name, *Martin*, had come to him directly from the saint's day on which he had been baptized, Nov. 11, when St. Martin of Tours, a fourth-century French bishop, was remembered by the Church. His affection for the saints is reflected in a sermon he delivered in 1537, when he said: "Thus I praise and laud the true saints, people graced and gifted with an understanding of Holy Scripture and with many fine, splendid endowments of the Holy Spirit, gifts which they also use for the improvement and encouragement of Christendom."

There are many Lutheran parishes that commemorate the names of saints (St. Laurence, St. Ambrose, and St. Athanasius. Yet, extensive celebrations of the lives and deeds of the saints in Lutheran congregations are not very common in 21st-century America. Are we in some way "shorting" ourselves by not remembering the saints as fully as we might?

Going back to the basics in learning about the saints may help us recover some of the faith-uplifting power that the stories of these devoted people supplied to previous generations.

A fundamental Lutheran document, The Apology of the Augsburg Confession (1530), clearly states the following: "We do not deny in our Confession that the saints should be honored. This may be done in three ways: first, by thanking God for showing us examples of his grace in the lives of the saints, and for supplying the church with teachers and other gifts. Now as these gifts are great, we should highly esteem them and praise the saints who made good use of them, as Christ in the Gospel praised the faithful servants, Matt. 25:21,23.

The second mode of honoring the saints is to strengthen our faith by their example. Thus, for instance, when we see that through the rich grace of God Peter's sin was forgiven, when he had denied Christ, our hearts receive strength to believe that grace abounds much more than sin, Rom. 5:20.

In the third place we honor the saints, by following, according to our several vocations, the example of their faith, love, and patience." (Article XXI(4-9): Of the Invocation of Saints).

The Lutheran Church is certainly not "short on saints" for, in the wider sense, we are all saints together by God's grace through the working of the Holy Spirit. In the *Apostles' Creed* we confess to our belief in "the holy Christian Church, the communion of saints."

Saints are certainly not mediators. Lutheranism teaches that believers, through Jesus Christ, can approach God directly in confession and through prayers. Saints can be examples of holy life.

The Calendar of Saints in the Lutheran Church suggests commemoration almost on a daily basis.

#### **Spiritual remembrances in March:**

John Wesley, died 1791; Charles Wesley, died 1788; renewers of the church. Sunday, March 2, 2025. These brothers led a revival originally intended to remain within the Church of England, one that involved frequent communion and advocacy for the poor. Except for a brief time in America, they worked in England. Charles was also a prolific hymn writer. After their deaths, their work led to the formation of the Methodist Church.

Perpetua and Felicity and companions, martyrs at Carthage, died 202. Friday, March 7, 2025. Vibia Perpetua, a noblewoman, and Felicity, an enslaved woman, were catechumens at Carthage, northern Africa. They, with four other catechumens, had defied the Roman emperor who had forbidden conversions to Christianity, and were put to death in the amphitheater.

Harriet Tubman, died 1913; Sojourner Truth, died 1883; renewers of society. Monday, March 10, 2025. Harriet Tubman, born into slavery, helped about 300 others to escape slavery until the institution was abolished. Sojourner Truth, whose birth name was Isabella, was freed after slavery was abolished, and discerned a call to be a preacher. Taking the name Sojourner Truth, she set out on an evangelistic journey, where people found her testimony to be deeply moving.

Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome, died 604. Wednesday, March 12, 2025. Born into wealth and power, Gregory was for a time the chief administrator of the city of Rome. Giving this up for a life in the church, he was elected pope in 590. He influenced public worship through the establishment of a lectionary and prayers to correlate with the readings. Gregorian chant is named in his honor.

Patrick, bishop, missionary to Ireland, died 461. Monday, March 17, 2025. A native of Britain, Patrick was kidnapped by pirates at age sixteen and sold into slavery in Ireland. After a few years, he escaped, returned home, and entered the ministry. Returning to Ireland, he successfully served as a bishop and missionary there.

Joseph, Guardian of Jesus. Wednesday, March 19, 2025. Though the Bible tells us little about the husband of Jesus' mother Mary, we know that he was a carpenter or builder by trade. He is also shown as being devoted both to God and to Mary and Jesus. It is assumed that he died before Jesus became an adult.

Thomas Cranmer, Bishop of Canterbury, martyr, died 1556. Friday, March 21, 2025. Cranmer's lasting achievement is contributing to and overseeing the creation of the Book of Common Prayer, which remains (in revised form) the worship book of the Anglican Communion. He was burned at the stake under Queen Mary for his support of the Protestant Reformation.

Jonathan Edwards, teacher, missionary to American Indians, died 1758. Saturday, March 22, 2025. A Puritan minister in Connecticut, Edwards is remembered as being a great preacher. Though his most famous sermon talks at length about hell, he was more concerned with God's love. He served both as missionary to the Housatonic people in Massachusetts, and as president of the future Princeton University.

Oscar Arnulfo Romero, Bishop of El Salvador, martyr, died 1980. Monday, March 24, 2025. Romero was deeply concerned with injustices evident toward the poor and powerless in El Salvador, and worked forthrightly against political repression. He was assassinated while presiding at the eucharist in a chapel near the cathedral in San Salvador.

Annunciation of Our Lord. Tuesday, March 25, 2025. Nine months before Christmas we celebrate the annunciation, in which the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would give birth to the Son of God. The ancient church believed that this was also the date of the world's creation and of Jesus' death on the cross.

Hans Nielsen Hauge, renewer of the church, died 1824. Saturday, March 29, 2025. Hauge was a layperson who wished to revitalize the church in Norway. As a result of a mystical experience, he felt called to preach. Many professionals in the church feared his motives and influence, and he was imprisoned for leading unauthorized gatherings.

John Donne, poet, died 1631, Monday, March 31, 2025. After finishing his education at Oxford University, Donne seemed headed for a career in the English public service. But a series of circumstances led him into the ordained ministry. He is well known as a writer of both secular and sacred poetry.

**LENT BEGINS WITH ASH WEDNESDAY ON MARCH 5<sup>th</sup>. What is Lent?** Lent is the 40-day period leading up to Easter (excluding Sundays) that starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. You may use the 40 days of Lent as a time of personal reflection to prepare your heart and mind for Good Friday and Easter.

What is Ash Wednesday? Shrove Tuesday is the day before Ash Wednesday. Traditionally, it's a time for confession, repentance, and feasting before the fasting season. The name "Shrove" comes from the Old English word *shriven*, meaning to confess sins and receive absolution.

On <u>Ash Wednesday</u>, worshippers are marked with a cross of ashes on their foreheads. These ashes are a reminder of our need for repentance and the reality of our human frailty. The Biblical support for this observation comes from the following verses:

Then I turned my face to the Lord God, seeking him by prayer and pleas for mercy with fasting and sackcloth and ashes (Daniel 9:3).

There was great mourning among the Jews, with fasting and weeping and lamenting, and many of them lay in sackcloth and ashes (Esther 4:3).

Now on the twenty-fourth day of this month the sons of Israel assembled with fasting, in sackcloth and with dirt upon them. (Nehemiah 9:1)

What are Other Key Dates of Lent? Palm Sunday is the last Sunday of Lent and opens the Holy Week, the week leading up to Easter and the final days of Jesus' life. Palm Sunday marks Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem, when people welcomed Him with palm branches, recognizing Him as their King.

Maundy or Holy Thursday remembers the Last Supper, when Jesus shared a final meal with His disciples and demonstrated humility by washing their feet.

<u>Good Friday</u> is a solemn day that commemorates Jesus' crucifixion and His ultimate sacrifice for our sins. Despite its sorrowful events, it's called "Good" because of the redemption Jesus secured for us.

Holy Saturday is a day of quiet reflection, as we remember Jesus' time in the tomb and anticipate the joy of what's to come. Finally, Easter Sunday bursts forth with celebration—Jesus is alive! His resurrection offers us hope, new life, and the promise of eternity with Him.

Why is Lent 40 days? The 40-day period of Lent is symbolic of significant biblical events, including:

- Jesus' 40 days of fasting and temptation in the wilderness (Matthew 4:1-11).
- Elijah's 40-day journey to Mount Horeb (1 Kings 19:8).
- Moses' 40 days on Mt. Sinai where he received the Ten Commandments (Exodus 34:28).
- The Israelites' 40 years of wandering in the desert (Numbers 14:33).
- The 40 days of rain during the Great Flood (Genesis 7:12).

Our Lenten series this year invites us to explore the theme of salvation through the five senses. Each week, we will focus on a different sense, reflecting on how touch, taste, smell, sight, and hearing can bring us closer to the divine.

Join us for a transformative journey this Lent. The Ash Wednesday service is celebrated on March 5 at 5:00 PM.

Lent services will be March 12, 19, 26, April 2 & 9 from 5:30 PM to 6:15 PM.

Preceding the Lent services will be soup & sandwich starting at 4:45 PM with the exception of April 2.

#### ON PRAYING THE NEWS

Often times, reading, watching or listening to the news may be challenging and overwhelming. Sometimes, it's wise to take a break from the news. But it's not a bad idea to pray about the news even before we get to hear them. Rabbi Irwin Keller composed the following prayer in 2016.

A Prayer Before Reading the News:

My God, the soul you have placed in me is pure and vulnerable.

I am afraid that looking at today's news will be painful.

Encircle me in a robe of light so that I can witness the wounds of the world without being wounded myself.

Let me learn what I need to know in order to be of my greatest use, without being overwhelmed by despair.

I feel your protective light now as I open myself to the world's suffering and the world's joys. Amen.

The news can bring pain and wounds and suffering with it and sometimes triggers overwhelming despair. So, we should admit how vulnerable we are and encircle ourselves in a robe of light as we "witness the wounds of the world."

We can remind ourselves that we are not alone, and we have the Spirit's power to endure, trust God and remain faithful. And look too for the news that announces the "world's joys" as well as the world's sorrows. We can pay attention to the goodness and joy in the news as well as the suffering. This includes generous people trying to do good things and the good creation blessing us in so many ways.



# THE HOLY LAND CHRISTIANS ARE GOING TO BE OUR GUESTS HEAR THEIR STORY AND SEE THEIR BEAUTIFUL OLIVEWOOD CRAFTS

On March 30, 2025, and during the service, we will be hearing about the Christians of the Holy Land, and after the service in the church Narthex we will be hosting a nice display of handmade olive wood religious articles from Bethlehem available for purchase. These carvings include olivewood Nativity sets, crosses, Christmas ornaments, candle holders, angels and many other religious crafts that could make a nice wedding, baptism, confirmation, Easter and Christmas gifts. The carvings are handmade by Christian families from Bethlehem who rely on it for their daily bread.

More than 70% of the Christian Community in the Holy Land depend upon tourism as their only source of income.

For decades those Christians have been enduring many hardships as tourism in Bethlehem has plummeted and access to other sources of income has been sharply restricted due to the ongoing conflict, the wars, the 12 yard wall built around Bethlehem, the COVID-19 pandemic, and nowadays the catastrophic ongoing war, due to this tourists are afraid and unable to visit the Holy Land. This made it very difficult for the Christian families to find their daily bread and forced them to immigrate and flee their homeland since they lost their source of income. The Christian population of the Holy Land was 30% in the last century, today it is less than 1%. If it continues like this, in few years we will find no Christians in the land of Christ, which could cause tragic consequences to our faith and holy sites.

Please help support our Christian brothers and sisters in the town of Bethlehem where Christ was born by purchasing their carvings.

A Christian family from Bethlehem will be telling us the story of the Christians of the Holy Land and they will be presenting these carvings after the services.

It is never too late to help. All proceeds go to support Christian families from Bethlehem.

Let us carefully tend to our roots, Christian children of God in the Holy Land. And let us pray together for peace in the land where our Savior once walked to tell the world the good news of salvation.


